### **SAT Score Results**

The Office of Minority Achievement connects students to SAT preparation course to help students prepare for taking the SAT exam. Students are provided an opportunity to enroll in the SAT Prep course at two points during the year.

The following data includes SAT test scores for students participating in the SAT Prep course for the 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14 and 2014-15. SAT scores include a students' best score results, meaning that the highest score from each section of each test taken by a student is used to determine their best overall score.

The current Strategic Plan indicates a target score of 1617 for the year 2017. In Figure 2 and Table 3 student scores were compared to the Strategic Plan target score and the percent of those scores above the target are reported.




Figure 1: Average SAT Score for SAT Prep Student Participants




Figure 2: Percent of Scores above the Strategic Plan Target Score



Figure 1: Average GPA for Middle School Students Participating in MA Programs






Figure 2: Average GPA for Middle School Students Participating in MA Programs by Race

Figure 3: Average GPA for High School Students Participating in MA Programs




Figure 4: Average GPA for High School Students Participating in MA Programs by Race






**Figure 1** shows the on-time graduation status and diploma type for all seniors who had participated in indicated Minority Achievement programs/services during the years included in this analysis.

Figure 2: 2011-12 Diploma Type by Race







Figure 3: 2013-14 Diploma Type by Race




Figure 5: Minority Achievement Program Participants Post-High School Plans





Figure 6: 2011-12 Minority Achievement Program Participants Post-High School Plans by Race








Figure 8: 2014-15 Minority Achievement Program Participants Post High School Plans by Race

#### Middle School

Figure 1: Percentage of middle school students participating in select Minority Achievement programs who enrolled in advanced coursework





### **High School**

Figure 2: Percentage of high school students participating in select Minority Achievement programs who enrolled in advanced coursework




