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BENCHMARKING ARTS COURSE OFFERINGS

Prepared for Arlington Public Schools

November 2017



To assist Arlington Public Schools (APS) in evaluating its existing arts course offerings, Hanover Research compares APS' arts courses to those offered at five peer school divisions in Virginia. This report also examines the distribution of APS' arts courses across its middle and high schools.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

INTRODUCTION

Arlington Public Schools (APS) is in the process of evaluating its arts offerings to determine whether its courses: 1) are comparable to peer school divisions; 2) are offered equitably across APS' schools; 3) satisfy the prerequisites for enrollment in art programs at colleges and universities; and 4) correspond with the skills and training required for entry-level work in arts occupations. APS has partnered with Hanover Research to assess the division's middle and high school arts courses. This report—the first phase of a two-phase study to evaluate APS' arts courses—benchmarks APS' offerings against five school divisions in Virginia:

- Alexandria City Public Schools;
- Clarke County Public Schools;
- Fairfax County Public Schools;
- Frederick County Public Schools;
and
- Loudoun County Public Schools.

The report summarizes arts courses at the above school divisions in two sections:

- **Section I: Overview of Peer Course Offerings** summarizes Hanover's methods for selecting peer school divisions and provides a broad overview of arts courses offered by each peer.
- **Section II: Peer Profiles** provides profiles of each peer school division's arts programs, summarizing: 1) the overall number and type of arts courses offered at each district at the middle and high school levels; 2) the number of Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), and dual enrollment courses offered; and 3) any notable or unique course offerings.
- **Section III: APS Arts Enrollment by School** examines average arts enrollment across APS' middle and high schools.

To complement the analysis provided in this report, an appendix provides lists of all courses offered by APS' peers and compares each peer's courses to courses offered by APS.

KEY FINDINGS

PEER COURSE OFFERINGS

- **APS is second only behind Fairfax in terms of the breadth and number of arts courses offered at both the middle and high school levels.** APS stands out in the following ways:
 - *High school:* APS offers more drama and media arts courses in high school than all other divisions except Fairfax. In addition, APS is the only division to offer a fine arts apprenticeship program in high school.
 - *Advanced arts courses:* APS is the only division besides Fairfax to offer a combination of AP, IB, and college dual-enrollment arts classes. APS and Fairfax are also the only divisions to offer advanced film study courses (although only one APS school offers film study).
- **At the high school level, peers with higher total enrollments generally offer a wider range of arts-related electives than those with smaller enrollments.** This includes increased availability of specialized topics and a higher number of advanced high school courses (such as Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate, and college dual enrollment courses). However, Loudoun County is a much larger division than APS and offers 30 fewer courses (including 13 fewer advanced courses) than APS.
- **Some divisions offer more specialized or advanced courses than those offered by APS.** Other districts offer types of music and visual arts courses not provided by APS, such as specialized ensemble courses (e.g. steel drums) or advanced design courses that address topics such as fabric, fashion and costume design, furniture, and interior and industrial design. Fairfax operates several high school learning communities focused on fine arts and offers courses in several topics not taught by APS or other peers at the high school level, such as dance and musical theater/acting.
- **Music courses comprise the largest proportion of arts courses at each peer division, followed by visual arts courses.** School divisions tend to offer multiple types of music courses in both middle school and high school, such as band, chorus, and orchestra. At the middle school level, APS' peer divisions generally require students to complete one fine arts elective each year, which may include a drama, chorus, instrumental music, or visual arts class. In high school, students may choose from a variety of arts-related electives in order to satisfy graduation requirements.

APS ARTS ENROLLMENT BY SCHOOL

- **Overall, fewer students enroll in arts courses in high school than in middle school, and there are more noticeable disparities in enrollment between the various high schools.** In middle school, around three-quarters of students enrolled in arts courses from 2014-15 to 2016-17 at APS' traditional middle schools, and around 90 percent of students enrolled in arts courses at HB-Woodlawn. At the high school level, H-B Woodlawn also had high proportion of students enrolled in arts (two-thirds of students in 2016-17). At APS' traditional high schools, arts enrollment at Wakefield and Washington-Lee (38 and 41 percent in 2016-17, respectively) is behind enrollment at Yorktown (54 percent of students enrolled in 2016-17).
- **H-B Woodlawn, Kenmore Middle School, and Yorktown High School offer more arts courses compared to their student populations than other schools.** At the middle school level, Swanson and Williamsburg have the highest course-to-student ratios, i.e. fewer courses compared to students (1:91 and 1:102, respectively), and H-B Woodlawn and Kenmore have the lowest ratios (1:24 and 1:51, respectively). At the high school level, H-B Woodlawn has the lowest course-to-student ratio (1:15), followed by Yorktown (1:55). Wakefield and Washington-Lee have the highest course-to-student ratio of 1:63.
- **At both the middle and high school levels, Hanover recommends that APS determine the reason that some schools have not reported enrollments in certain arts courses in the most recent school year.** That is, APS should determine whether lack of enrollment is due to lack of student interest, scheduling issues, lack of instructional staff, or other reasons. At the middle school level, Swanson did not report recent enrollments in Guitar or Intermediate Orchestra, and Williamsburg did not report recent enrollments in Advanced Chorus, Beginning Band, or Beginning Orchestra. At the high school level, Wakefield and Washington-Lee did not report recent enrollments in Painting/Drawing and Song Writing.

SECTION I: OVERVIEW OF PEER COURSE OFFERINGS

This section summarizes Hanover’s methods for selecting peer school divisions and provides a broad overview of arts courses offered by each peer.

METHODS

PEER LIST

To create an initial list of school divisions to benchmark, Hanover first consulted the Washington Area Board of Education’s (WABE) membership listing and identified Washington-area divisions located in Virginia.¹ In addition, Hanover consulted the Virginia Department of Education (VDOE) to identify all public school divisions located within APS’s Regional area (“Region 4”).²

After identifying all peers located with APS’s region, Hanover conducted a preliminary investigation of division websites and online course catalogs to determine the availability of information relevant to course benchmarking. School divisions vastly differ in how they organize and present information on courses offered at middle and high schools. As a result of this initial scan, Hanover identified five Virginia school divisions with comprehensive, publicly available information on their arts course offerings: Alexandria City Public Schools, Fairfax County Public Schools, Loudoun County Public Schools, Clarke County Public Schools, and Frederick County Public Schools.

Other local Virginia peer districts, such as Falls Church City Public Schools, Manassas City Public Schools, Manassas Park City Schools, and Prince William County Public Schools, provide little detailed information on their arts programming at both the middle and high school levels and are therefore excluded from this analysis.

COURSE INCLUSION AND CATEGORIZATION

To determine the number of arts courses offered by each school division, Hanover counted all courses listed under the categories of “fine arts,” “visual arts,” “music,” “theater arts,” “drama,” “dance,” or other similar categories in each district’s course catalog or Program of Studies. In addition, Hanover searched for digital- and media-related courses which align with APS’ fine arts offerings, such as courses related to graphic design, film study, and television and multimedia production. **Multiple sections of the same course** (including semester- and year-long versions of the same topic) **were not listed as separate courses**

unless the content or focus differed significantly across sections. Courses which include some arts or design content, but in which arts are not the primary focus of the course (such as photojournalism, yearbook, and computer software and technology courses), were excluded from this report.

To compare APS' arts courses to its peers' offerings, this report classifies arts courses into the following categories:

- **Dance:** Any dance-related class, including color guard;³
- **Drama:** E.g., theater arts and technical theater;
- **Media Arts:** E.g., film study, television production, and graphic design;
- **Music:** E.g. band, orchestra, chorus, ensemble, and music theory;
- **Visual arts:** E.g., studio art, drawing, painting, design, sculpture, photography, crafts, and ceramics;
- **Other:** Hanover classified APS' fine arts apprenticeship as "other" because the apprentice may focus on any arts-related topic.⁴

Because this analysis relies on information provided by school division websites, APS should note that the courses listed in this report and appendix may not be a comprehensive representation of all arts courses offered by each division, as not all school divisions may provide up-to-date information on their websites.

SUMMARY OF ARTS COURSES

OVERVIEW

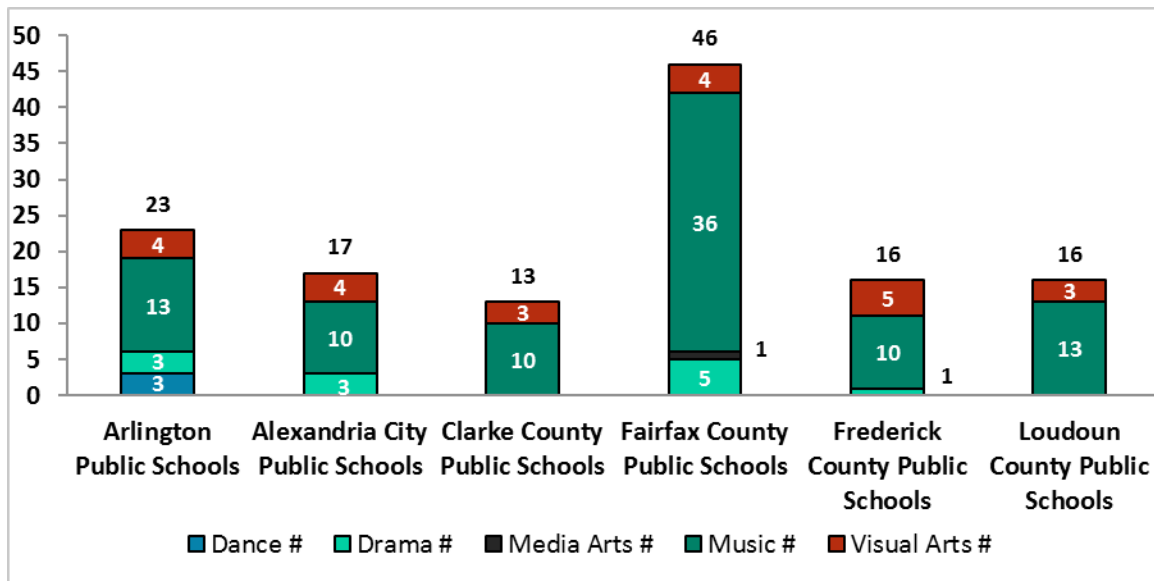
Figure 1.1: Overview of APS and Peer District Arts Courses

Figure 1.1 on the following page provides an overview of all arts courses offered by APS and peers. As expected, larger divisions generally offer a higher number of arts courses. However, APS offers 30 more courses than Loudoun County Public Schools, a much larger division. Fairfax County Public Schools, the largest division examined, offers the highest number of arts courses (164 total courses).

Figure 1.2 below shows the distribution of arts courses at the middle school level. **Music courses are the most popular arts course offering in middle school.** Only some districts offer drama courses, and only Fairfax County Public Schools offers a middle school media arts course. APS is the only division which offers dance classes in middle school; however, this option is available at only one of APS' schools.

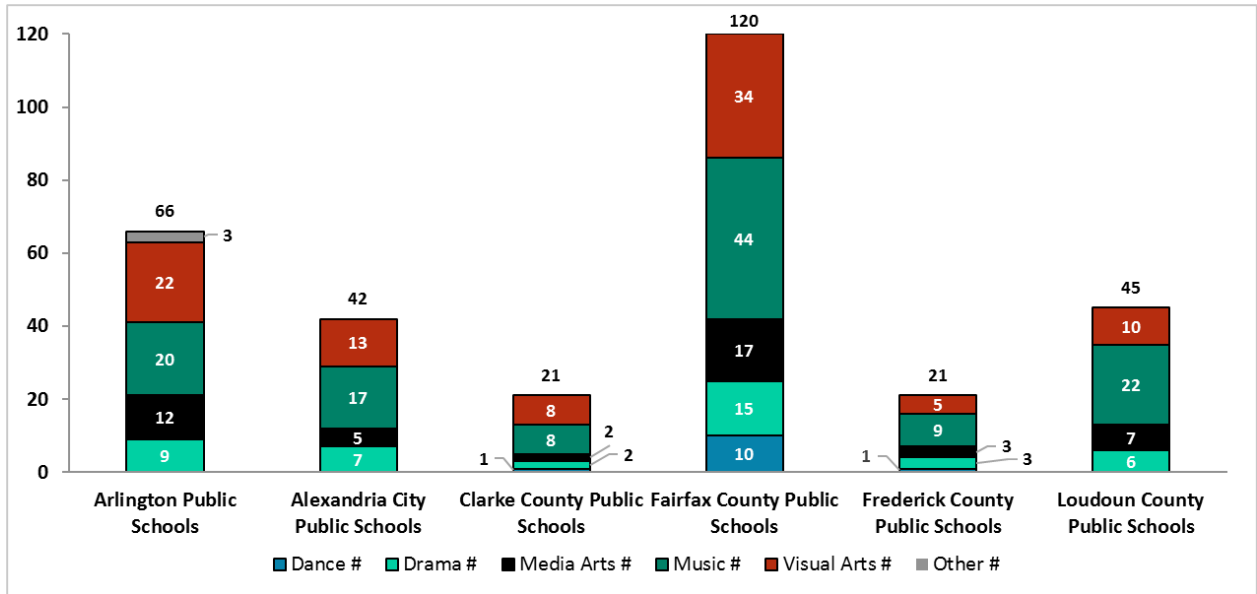

Figure 1.3 below provides an overview of arts courses offered at the high school level by APS and its peers. Visual arts and music courses account for a majority of high school arts course offerings. **APS offers a notable number of drama and media arts courses compared to most other school divisions examined in this report.** Fairfax County Public Schools is the only division which offers a notable number of dance courses at the high school level.

Figure 1.4: Arts Course Distribution by Course Type and School District – High School Courses

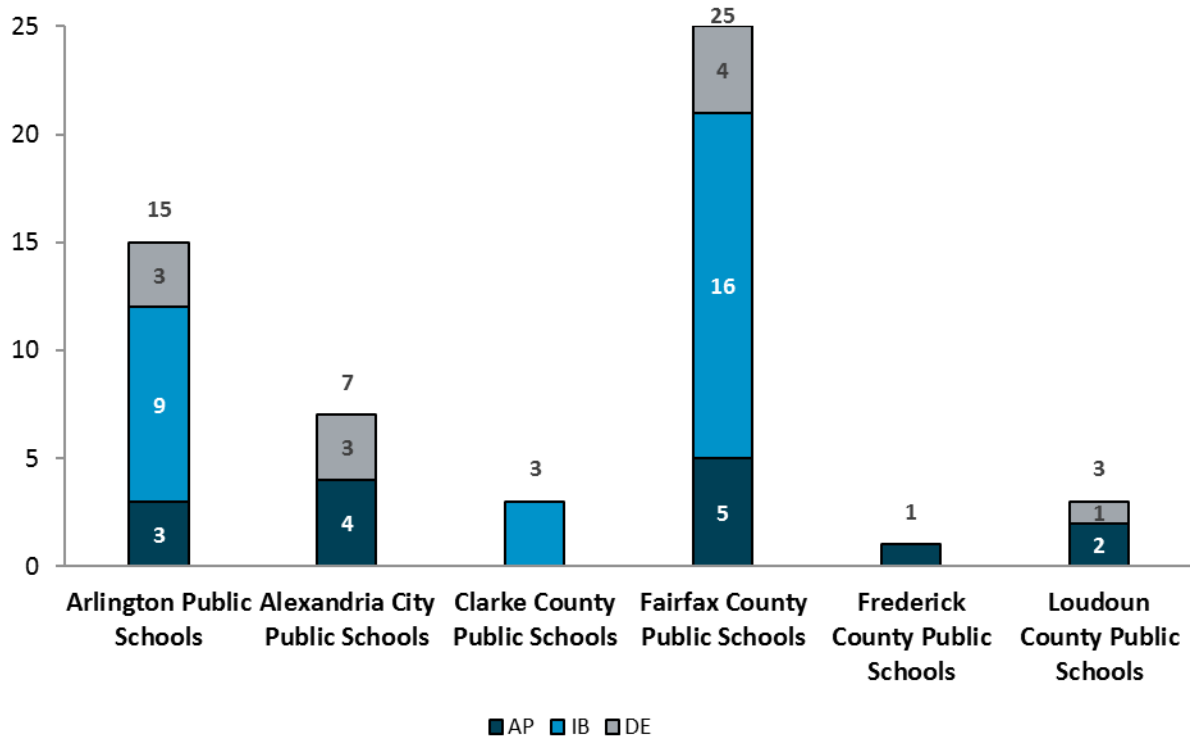

ADVANCED HIGH SCHOOL COURSES

In addition to examining the overall number and type of courses offered at each district, Hanover determined the number of Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), and college dual enrollment arts courses offered by each district. Figure 1.4 on the following page displays an overview of advanced high school arts classes offered by each district. **APS, with 15 total advanced courses, offers the second-highest number of advanced courses after Fairfax, which offers 25 advanced arts courses.**

COURSES NOT OFFERED BY APS

To further assist APS in identifying potential gaps in its arts course offerings, Hanover examined each arts course offered by APS’ peers and determined whether APS provides a similar or equivalent course. Figure 1.6 on the following page provides an overview of peer arts courses which APS does not appear to offer (based on a review of each division’s course catalog, APS’ most recent Program of Studies, and the most recent APS course listing provided to Hanover).⁹

Some of APS’ peer divisions offer more specialized or advanced courses than those offered by APS. For example, Fairfax offers four levels of “Technical Theater” (in addition to four levels of theater arts) in high school. Other districts offer types of music and visual arts courses not offered by APS, such as specialized ensemble courses (e.g. steel drums) or advanced design courses that address topics such as fabric, fashion and costume design, furniture, and interior and industrial design. Fairfax offers the widest range of arts courses due to the fact that it operates two “academies,” or high school learning

communities, focused on fine arts.¹⁰ It offers courses in several topics not taught by APS or other peers at the high school level, such as several dance courses and musical theater/acting courses.

APS' UNIQUE OFFERINGS

APS is the only school division to offer a fine arts apprenticeship program.¹⁴ The program, designed for “exceptionally talented” Grades 10-12 students, allows students to enroll in three full-year, one-half credit courses related to visual arts, music, theater, or dance. Further, APS is the only division besides Fairfax to offer advanced film study courses (although these courses are available only at one school, H.B. Woodlawn).¹⁵

SECTION II: PEER PROFILES

This section provides profiles of each peer school division’s arts programs, summarizing: 1) the overall number and type of arts courses offered at each district at the middle and high school levels; 2) the number of Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), and dual enrollment courses offered; and 3) any notable or unique course offerings.

ALEXANDRIA CITY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

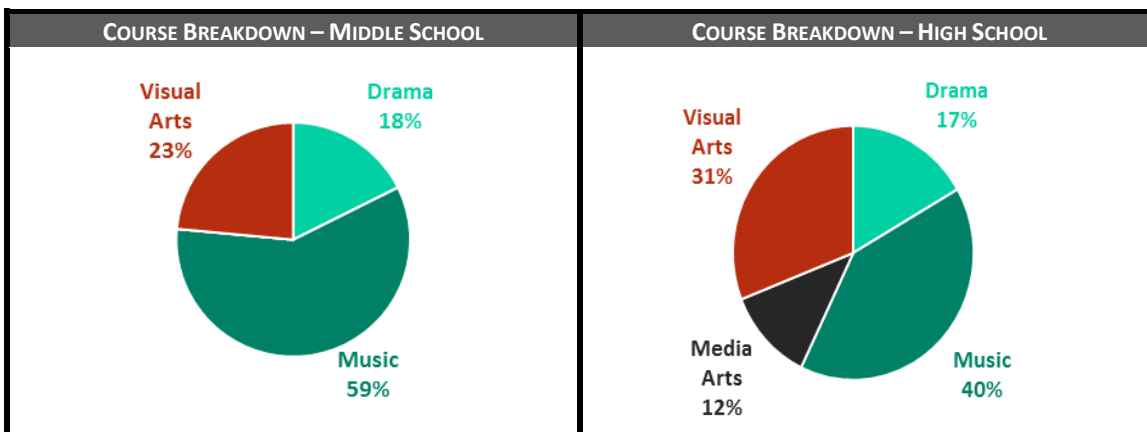
OVERVIEW

In FY 2016, Alexandria City Public Schools’ (ACPS) total enrollment was 14,729 across 16 schools, which include two middle schools and one high school.¹⁶ ACPS offers a total of 59 arts classes at the middle and high school levels. Seven high school courses are offered as AP, IB, or dual college enrollment courses.¹⁷



As shown in Figure 2.1, music courses constitute the largest share of the district’s arts courses, followed by visual arts courses.

ACPS’ major arts courses include: general theater arts and drama courses; a variety of band, orchestra, and choir offerings; graphic design and media production; and several studio and commercial art courses, as shown in Figure 2.2 below.¹⁸

From Grades 6 to 8, students must complete an equivalent of two full-year electives in each grade—full-year music courses or semester-long visual arts and speech and drama courses may meet this elective requirement.²⁰ In high school, all arts courses count towards elective credits.²¹ To graduate, students must complete two sequential fine arts, CTE, or other

elective courses in a core academic discipline (as required by the Virginia Department of Education).²² Additional fees are not associated with any of the district’s arts courses.²³

AP, IB, AND DUAL ENROLLMENT COURSES

ACPS offers a total of four AP courses and three dual enrollment courses related to the arts (Figure 2.3). AP offerings include two studio art courses, a music theory course, and an art history course. Students who enroll in AP courses are required to take end-of-course AP exams, the cost of which is paid by ACPS.²⁴ ACPS dual enrollment courses include a theater practicum (in which students participate in the preparation and execution of a play or performance festival) and two television and media production courses. Dual enrollment courses are offered through the Northern Virginia Community College.²⁵

OTHER NOTABLE COURSE OFFERINGS

ACPS appears to be the only peer division which offers courses focusing on commercial art (although APS does offer media arts courses through its CTE Program). The division offers two high school photography courses—Commercial Photography I and II—designed to give students “an advantage in today’s global, multimedia society” by teaching them “industry-relevant skills” related to film and digital photography. In the second course, students develop portfolios designed to help them advance in photography-relevant careers.²⁷

CLARKE COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

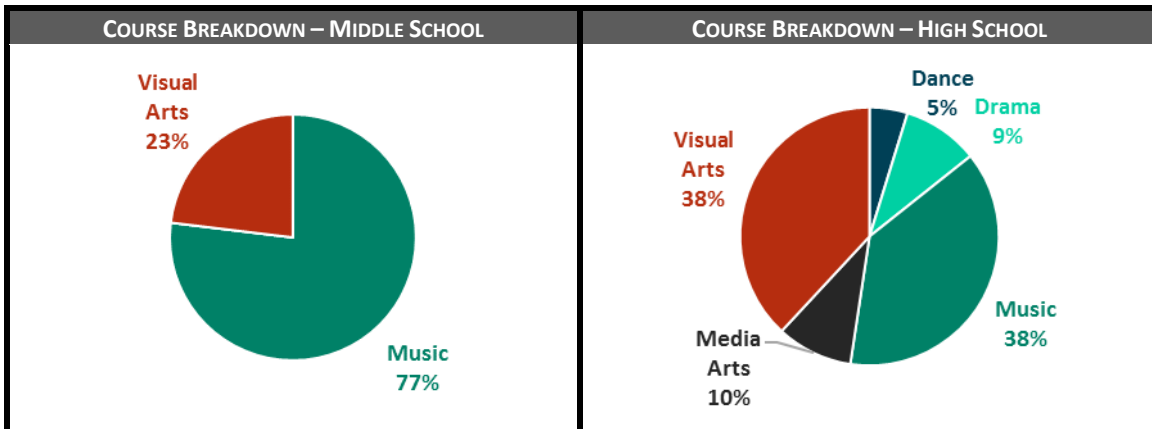
OVERVIEW

Clarke County Public Schools (CCPS), a small school division based in Berryville, Virginia, consists of two elementary schools, one middle school, and one high school.²⁸ The district had a total of 1,995 students in the 2014-15 school year.²⁹ CCPS has the lowest number of arts courses of those profiled in this report, with just 34 total courses.³⁰



As shown in Figure 2.4, most of CCPS' arts courses are related to music and visual arts.

Figure 2.5 below provides an overview of arts-related topics offered at the middle and high school levels. Additional fees are required for all high school visual arts courses.³¹ At the middle school level, students enroll in two full-year electives in each grade from Grades 6 to 8. Students may choose from courses such as concert band and chorus (Grades 6-8), jazz band (Grades 7-8), marching band (Grade 8), and an “exploratory” course which consists of 12-week rotations related to visual arts (Grades 6-8) and graphic arts (Grade 8).³²

In high school, students may enroll in a variety of arts courses to meet the elective requirements needed for graduation. High school-level arts topics include theater arts; band, percussion, music theory, and choir; multimedia design; and studio art, ceramics, and photography. The division’s one dance-related course is color guard.³³

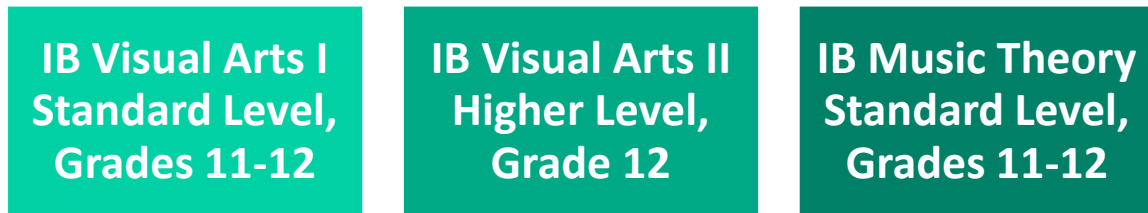

AP, IB, AND DUAL ENROLLMENT COURSES

CCPS offers just three IB courses, as shown in Figure 2.6: Visual Arts I and II and Music Theory. The visual arts courses are intended to be taken together as a two-year course—both years must be completed in order for students to be assessed by external IB examiners.³⁵

The division does not offer any AP or dual enrollment arts courses.

OTHER NOTABLE COURSE OFFERINGS

CCPS is the only division which offers a course specifically devoted to steel drums. The Steel Drum Ensemble course, available to all Grades 9-12 students, helps students “develop their ability to read and play music” on steel drums.³⁷

FAIRFAX COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

OVERVIEW

With a total student enrollment of 185,979 across 198 schools, Fairfax County Public Schools (Fairfax) is the largest peer school division examined in this report.³⁸ It also has the largest number of distinct arts courses, with approximately 166 courses offered at its 23 middle schools and 25 high schools.³⁹ Fairfax offers a wider array of arts courses than other districts profiled in this report primarily due to its size and the presence of “academy” high schools, or small learning communities designed for students interested in careers in fine and performing arts, design, and communications.⁴⁰

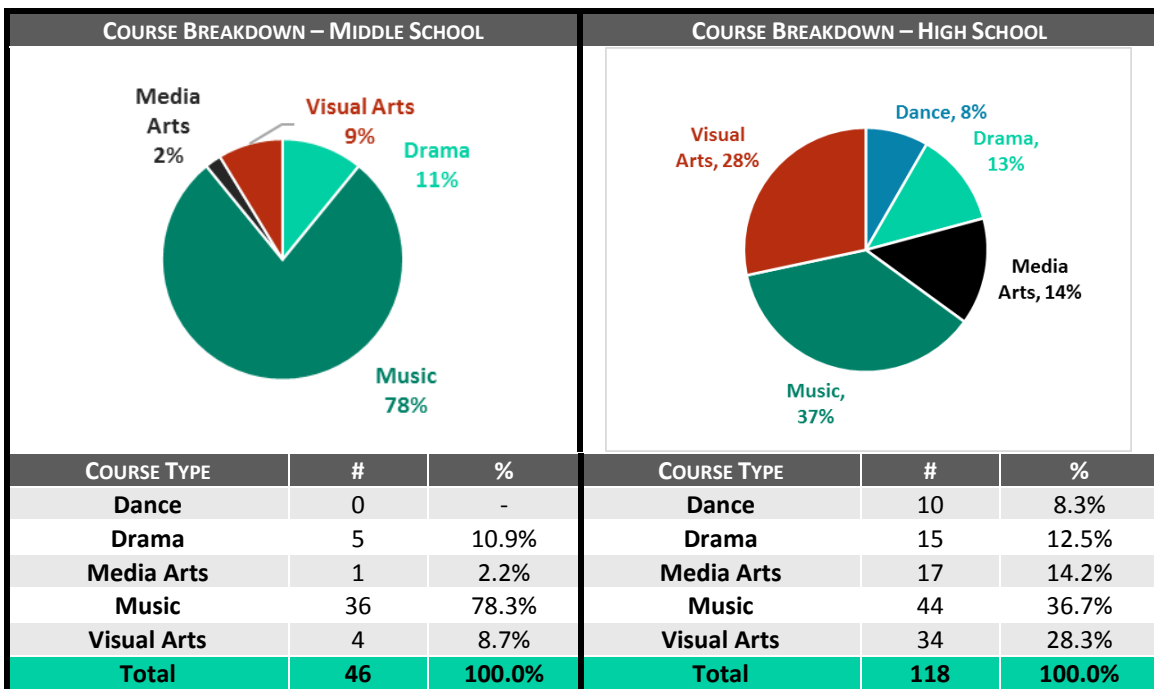

As shown in Figure 2.7, music courses account for the majority of course offerings at the middle school level (78 percent), but comprise just 37 percent of offerings at the high school level.

Fairfax offers a wide range of arts classes at both the middle and high school levels, including multiple dance courses at the high school level and multiple levels of theater arts, musical instrument, and studio art classes (Figure 2.8). Students may receive elective credit for fine arts courses in both middle and high school. Most arts courses (including theater arts) require an additional fee. Some courses (such as certain dance, acting, and music composition courses) are offered only at “academy” high schools.⁴¹

AP, IB, AND DUAL ENROLLMENT COURSES

Fairfax offers the highest number of advanced high school arts courses among the divisions profiled in this report, with five AP courses, 16 IB courses, and four dual enrollment courses

(Figure 2.9). AP courses include AP Music Theory, AP Art History, and three AP Studio Art courses (drawing, 2-D, and 3-D design). In terms of IB courses, Fairfax offers two-year standard level and higher level courses in music, theater arts, and film study. Finally, Fairfax’s dual enrollment courses include Music and Computer Technology I and II, Studio Art and Design, and Ceramics, all offered through Northern Virginia Community College.⁴³

OTHER NOTABLE COURSE OFFERINGS

Fairfax is the only peer division profiled in this report to offer courses related to jewelry making and print-making.⁴⁵ In addition, it offers a much wider range of dance and acting classes than other divisions examined by Hanover.⁴⁶

FREDERICK COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

OVERVIEW

Frederick County Public Schools (Frederick), based in Winchester, Virginia, is home to more than 13,100 students and 23 schools, including four middle schools and three high schools.⁴⁷ Although the division has a much higher enrollment than CCPS, it offers a total of 37 distinct arts courses, just three more than CCPS.⁴⁸



As shown in Figure 2.10 on the following page, music courses comprise 63 percent of the district's arts offerings at the middle school level and 43 percent of offerings at the high school level. Visual arts courses are the next most popular type of arts course.

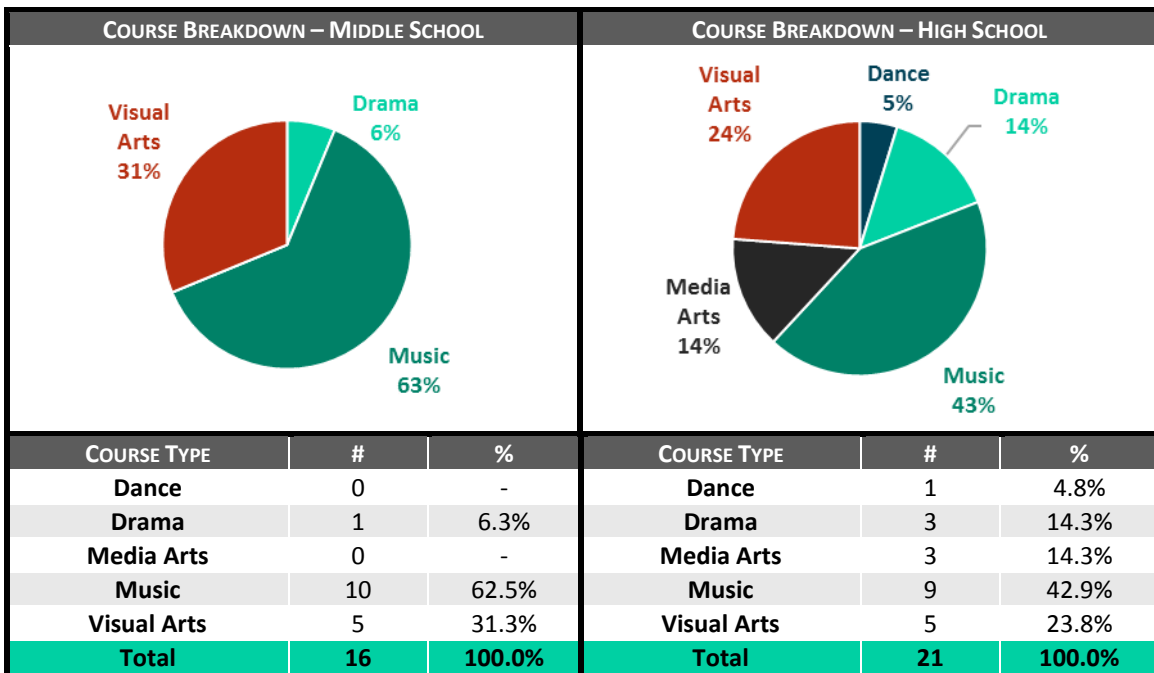

Figure 2.11 on the following page shows the major topics covered by Frederick’s arts courses. In Grade 6, students may enroll in up to six “exploratory” courses, which include a general music course, a general visual arts course, and a chorus course.⁴⁹ In Grades 7 and 8, students select two periods of either semester- or year-long electives, which include several band and chorus courses, jazz ensemble, percussion ensemble, a drama and oral interpretation course, and a general visual arts course.⁵⁰

In high school, students may choose from several arts-related electives to meet graduation requirements related to fine arts/CTE. High school arts courses include: color guard; drama (housed by the English department); music courses including chorus, choir, band, jazz ensemble, and AP Music Theory/History; several media arts courses (housed by the Technology Education department); and several drawing, painting, and design, courses. Additional fees are required for high school music classes and both middle and high school visual arts classes.⁵¹

AP, IB, AND DUAL ENROLLMENT COURSES

Among the divisions profiled in this report, Frederick offers the lowest number of advanced high school arts courses, offering just one AP course—**AP Music Theory/History**. Frederick does not provide an introductory music theory course; rather, students with at least three years of music experience may receive a teacher recommendation to participate in the AP course.⁵³

OTHER NOTABLE COURSE OFFERINGS

Unlike other divisions profiled in this report, Frederick does *not* appear to offer any visual arts classes related to 3-D design, sculpture, or ceramics.

LOUDON COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

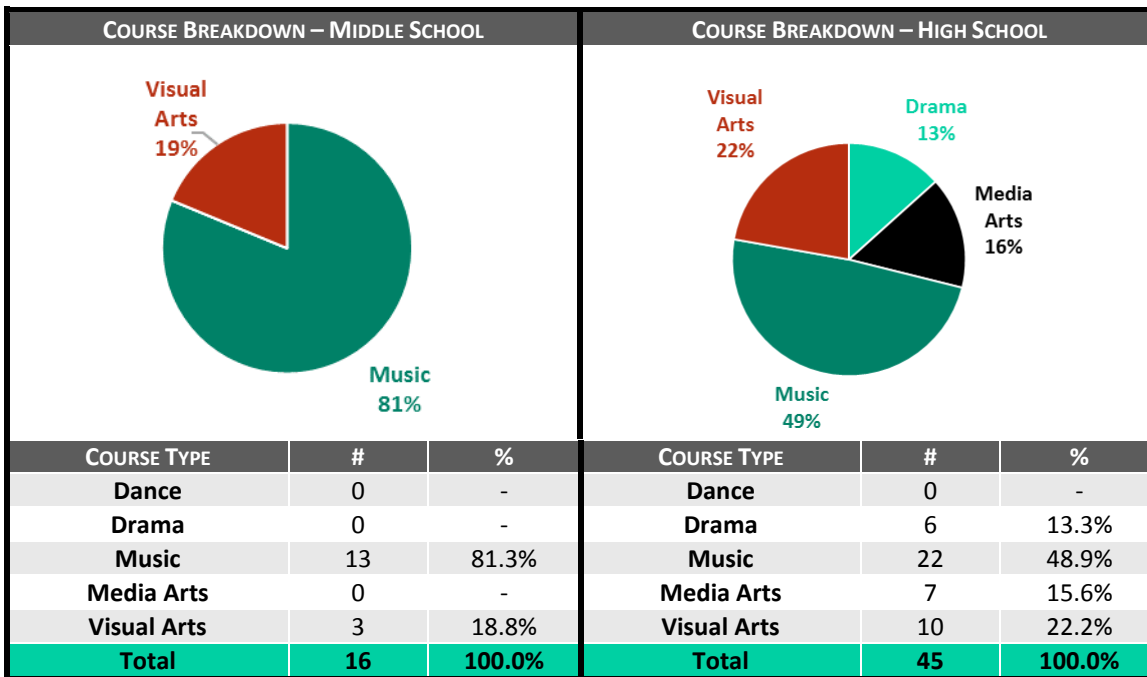
OVERVIEW

Loudoun County Public Schools (LCPS) is based in Ashburn, Virginia and is the third-largest public school division in the state.⁵⁴ In 2016, a total of 76,263 students were enrolled in the district’s 89 schools, which include 15 middle schools and 15 high schools.⁵⁵ The division offers a total of 61 distinct arts courses.⁵⁶



Like other divisions examined in this report, music courses account for a majority of LCPS’ arts offerings, followed by visual arts courses (Figure 2.12).

As shown in Figure 2.13, LCPS offers a wide range of arts-related courses, including: guitar, strings, and band; music theory; several theater arts and technical theater courses; courses in television production and digital moviemaking; and several studio art and art history courses. Additional fees are not required for arts courses.⁵⁷

Unlike most divisions profiled in this report, **LCPS requires all Grade 6 students to take a visual arts course (Art 6) and a music elective (chorus, music lab, strings, or band).**⁵⁹ Grade 7 students must take one arts elective (either visual arts or music), and Grade 8 students must take two electives in any non-core subject, which may include visual arts or music.⁶⁰ In high school, LCPS students may choose from the above courses to meet the fine arts/CTE elective requirements needed for graduation.⁶¹

AP, IB, AND DUAL ENROLLMENT COURSES

LCPS offers one dual enrollment course and two AP courses in arts-related topics, as shown in Figure 2.14. The district’s AP offerings are AP Music Theory and AP Studio Art. In AP

Studio Art, students may choose to focus on drawing, 2-D design, or 3-D design.⁶² The dual enrollment course, offered through Northern Virginia Community College, is Computer and Digital Animation I, an “introductory course in digital content creation and animation.”⁶³

OTHER NOTABLE COURSE OFFERINGS

LCPS offers a wider range of course levels than most other divisions profiled in this report, offering four or more levels of orchestra, guitar, theater arts, and studio art, and two or more levels of art history, technical theater, and music theory.⁶⁵ However, unlike some of the other large divisions examined, LCPS does not offer any IB courses.

ARLINGTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS

OVERVIEW

APS’ approximate current enrollment is 26,414 according to the district’s “Quick Facts” factsheet.⁶⁶ Hanover counted a total of 89 arts courses offered in the district’s middle and high schools, including 15 AP, IB, and dual enrollment courses.⁶⁷

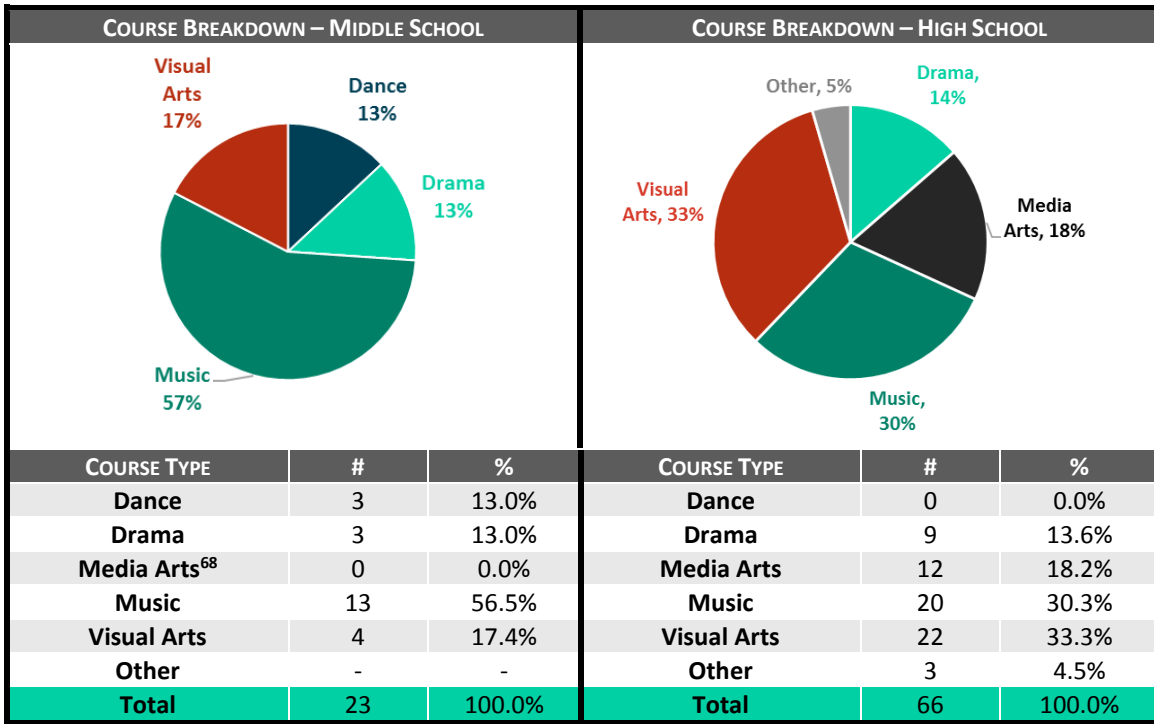

Figure 2.15 below provides an overview of APS’ arts course offerings. Music courses account for a majority of arts courses in middle school (57 percent). At the high school level, arts courses primarily consist of visual arts (32 percent), music (29 percent), and media arts (21 percent).

As shown in Figure 2.16 on the following page, APS’ arts courses encompass a range of topics at the middle and high school levels. In addition to general band, orchestra, and chorus classes at the middle school level, APS also offers courses in jazz, piano, and guitar. At the high school level, APS offers courses in general theater arts as well as in technical theater and directing; a range of music courses, including guitar, jazz vocal and instrumental courses, and song writing and music theory; various media arts courses, including film study, graphic communication, photo and video technology; and television and multimedia production; and a number of visual arts courses, including digital photography, ceramics, crafts, and sculpture.

AP, IB, AND DUAL ENROLLMENT COURSES

As shown in Figure 2.17 on the following page, APS offers a total of 3 Advanced Placement courses, 11 IB courses, and 2 dual enrollment courses.⁷¹ AP courses include music theory, art history, and studio art, while IB courses include music (standard level), theater arts (two standard and one higher level), film study two standard and two higher levels), and visual arts (one standard and two higher levels). In addition, students may enroll in Television and Multimedia Production I and II and Digital Photography III for dual credit at Northern Virginia Community College.⁷²

SECTION III: APS ARTS COURSE ANALYSIS

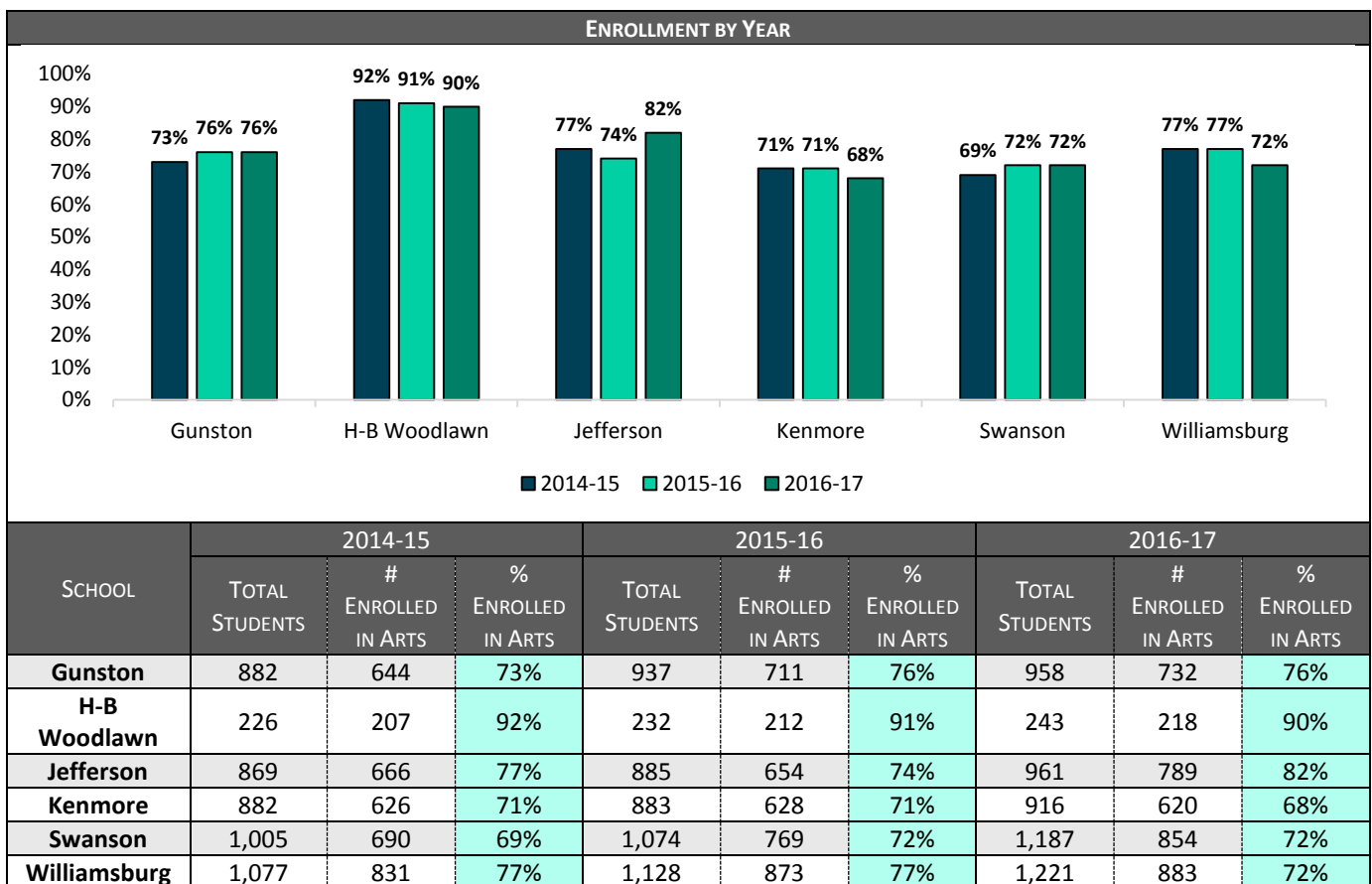
This section discusses average arts enrollment at each APS school, calculates the student-to-arts course ratio at each school, and compares actual enrollment in arts courses to the courses listed in APS’ Program of Studies (POS) for middle and high school.

AVERAGE ENROLLMENT BY SCHOOL

MIDDLE SCHOOL

As shown in Figure 3.1 below, **H-B Woodlawn** has the largest proportion of students enrolled in the arts, with 90 percent of students enrolled in arts courses in the 2016-17 school year. In terms of traditional middle schools, **Jefferson** had the highest arts enrollment in the most recent school year (82 percent), but was similar to the other schools in 2014-15 and 2015-16 (around three-quarters of students enrolled in arts courses).

Figure 3.1: Middle School Arts Enrollment, 2014-15 to 2016-17



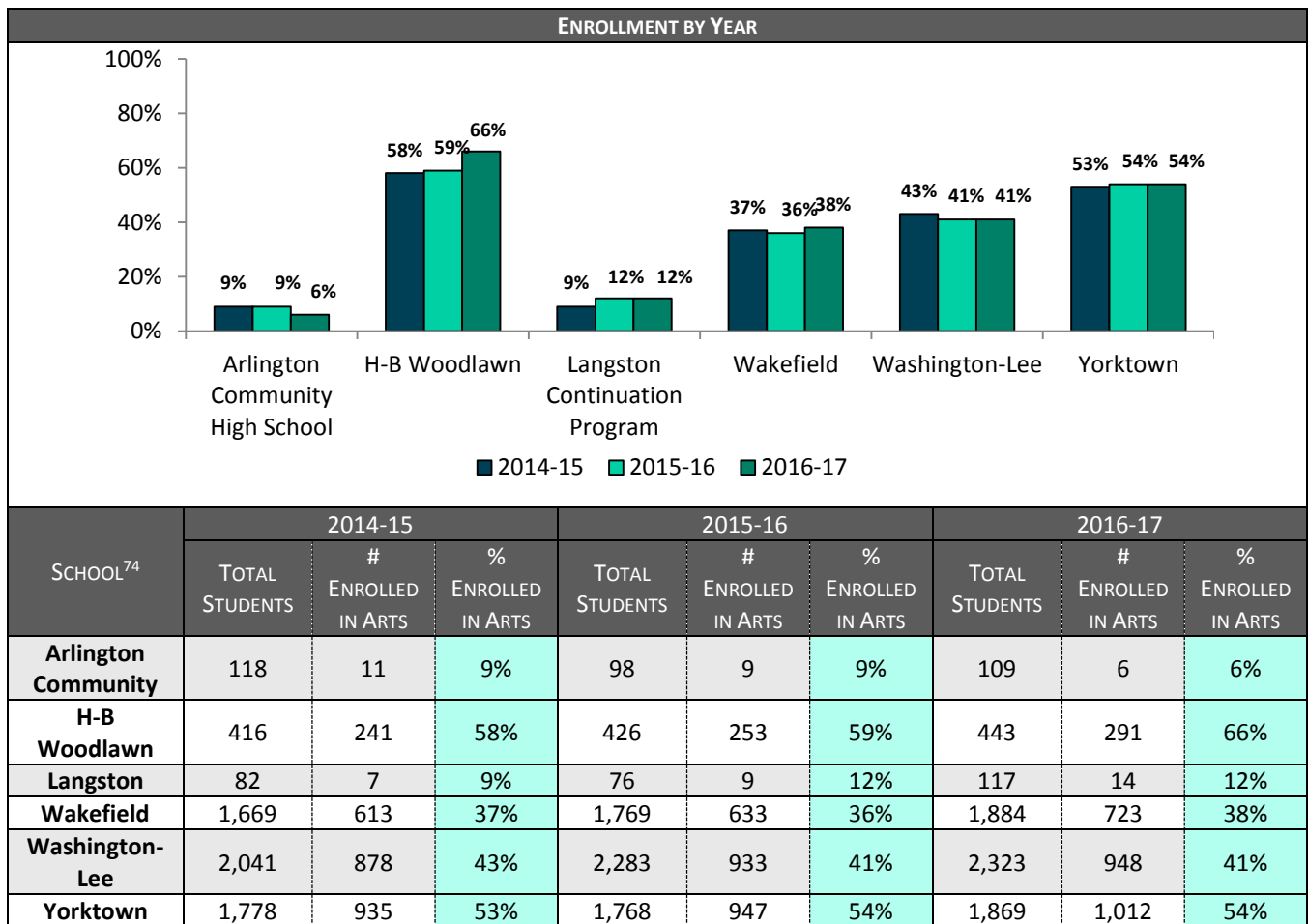

HIGH SCHOOL

Overall, fewer students enroll in arts courses in high school than in middle school. Although around three-quarters of students tend to enroll in arts courses each year in middle school, less than two-thirds of high school students enroll in arts courses in high school (Figure 3.2 below).

Among APS' traditional high schools, Wakefield had the lowest proportion of students enrolled in the arts. In the most recent school year, just 38 percent of Wakefield students enrolled in arts courses. This is slightly behind Washington-Lee (41 percent) and noticeably lower than Yorktown, where 54 percent of students enrolled in arts courses in 2016-17.

COURSE-TO-STUDENT RATIOS BY SCHOOL

To further assist APS in understanding its arts course distribution, Hanover calculates the ratio of arts courses to total students in 2016-17. That is, we compare the total number of arts courses in which students enrolled at each school to the overall student population. At the middle school level, **Swanson** and **Williamsburg** have the highest course-to-student ratios, i.e. fewer courses compared to total students (1:91 and 1:102, respectively), and H-B Woodlawn and Kenmore have the lowest ratios (1:24 and 1:51, respectively). At the high school level, H-B Woodlawn has the lowest course-to-student ratio (1:15), followed by Yorktown (1:55). **Wakefield** and **Washington-Lee** have the lowest course-to-student ratio of 1:63.

GAPS BETWEEN ENROLLMENT AND PROGRAM OF STUDIES

Figure 3.4 on the following page shows middle school arts enrollment by course in the most recent school year. Based on Hanover's understanding of APS' Program of Studies (POS), we identified the following potential gaps between courses listed in the POS and courses in which students actually enrolled:

- **Jefferson:** No recent enrollments in Intermediate Orchestra.
- **Kenmore:** No recent enrollments in Guitar.
- **Swanson:** No recent enrollments in Guitar or Intermediate Orchestra.
- **Williamsburg:** No recent enrollments in Advanced Chorus, Beginning Band, or Beginning Orchestra.

At both the middle and high school levels, Hanover recommends that APS determine the reason that some schools have not reported enrollments in certain arts courses in the most recent school year, i.e. whether lack of enrollment is due to lack of student interest, scheduling issues, lack of instructional staff, or other reasons.

- **Wakefield.** No recent enrollments in AP Music Theory, Ceramics II and III, Computer Graphics, Crafts I (Semester), Ensembles, Film Study II, Painting and Drawing, and Song Writing.
- **Washington-Lee.** No recent enrollments in Advanced Theatre IV, AP Music Theory, Crafts, Crafts I (Semester), Film Study and Film Study II, Painting and Drawing, Song Writing, and Theatre Arts III.
- **Yorktown.** No recent enrollments in Advanced Choir, Beginning Instrumental, and Crafts.

In this report, Hanover Research presents an analysis of the skills and qualifications required for admission into postsecondary arts programs and entry into arts-related occupations.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY AND KEY FINDINGS

INTRODUCTION

Arlington Public Schools (APS) is in the process of evaluating its arts course offerings to determine whether these courses: 1) are comparable to peer school divisions; 2) are offered equitably across APS' schools; 3) satisfy the prerequisites for enrollment in programs at colleges and universities; and 4) correspond with the skills and training required for gaining entry-level work in the arts. As such, APS has partnered with Hanover Research to assess the division's middle and high school arts courses. This report addresses the latter two research questions related to postsecondary prerequisites and entry-level training in two sections:

- **Section I: Postsecondary Arts Prerequisites and Admissions Requirements** provides an overview of arts program admissions requirements at 13 institutions of higher education in APS' region and nationally.
- **Section II: Employment Projections** describes typical entry-level requirements for arts-related occupations and examines long-term employment projections at the national and regional levels.

To complement the analysis provided in this report, the accompanying data supplement, "College and Career Readiness in the Arts – Data Supplement," provides a detailed overview of admissions and application requirements in arts programs at the 13 institutions discussed in this report.

KEY FINDINGS

- **Although most postsecondary programs require applicants to demonstrate experience and skills in their chosen field, few require students to complete a specific course sequence in high school.** Students must provide evidence of their skills and ability through auditions, portfolios, personal statements, resumes, interviews, or other application materials. However, evidence of the applicant's skills can be derived from in-school coursework as well as from out-of-school activities and experiences. Just a small number of programs explicitly encourage applicants to complete secondary coursework related to their chosen major—the Maryland College Institute of Art, for example, encourages students to enroll in high school arts classes which build skills over time, including Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate classes.
- **Common application requirements for arts programs include the following:**
 - *Dance:* Applicants are generally required to demonstrate ballet barre and modern dance techniques in their audition.
 - *Drama:* Applicants to acting programs are generally required to complete an audition consisting of at least two brief, contrasting monologues. Musical theater applicants typically complete an acting audition as well as a voice audition (consisting of around two songs in different styles) and a jazz dance audition. Applicants to technical theater and dramaturgy programs must submit a portfolio showing evidence of their experience in theater and/or writing samples demonstrating their ability to critically analyze dramatic works.
 - *Music:* Applicants to performance programs usually complete an audition in which they play several pieces of contrasting styles from the instrument's standard repertoire. Typically, they must also demonstrate their ability to sight read and play major and minor scales. Voice applicants must perform several songs of contrasting styles in different languages (e.g. French, Italian, German). Composition applicants are generally required to complete a performance audition and submit a portfolio of around three to five original compositions.
 - *Visual and Media Arts.* Applicants are generally required to submit a portfolio of around 10 to 20 works demonstrating their technical skills, creativity, and approach to visual arts and design. However, these works are usually not required to have been completed in a high school course.
- **Nationally and in APS' region, arts occupations for which the highest growth is expected from 2014 to 2024 include Actors and Multimedia Artists and Animators.** In addition, Graphic Designers are a very high-volume occupation for which some growth is expected. Typical entry-level qualifications for these and other arts-related occupations is a bachelor's degree or moderate- to long-term on-the-job training.

SECTION I: POSTSECONDARY ARTS PREREQUISITES AND ADMISSIONS REQUIREMENTS

This section provides an overview of admissions requirements in arts programs at Virginia universities and select studio art, conservatory, and performing arts schools, including:

- Carnegie Mellon University;
- Eastman School of Music, University of Rochester;
- George Mason University;
- James Madison University;
- Julliard School;
- Maryland Institute College of Art;
- Oberlin College and Conservatory;
- Rhode Island School of Design;
- School of the Art Institute of Chicago;
- University of California, Los Angeles;
- College-Conservatory of Music, University of Cincinnati;
- Virginia Commonwealth University; and
- Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University (Virginia Tech).

In addition, the data supplement accompanying this report provides a detailed description of admissions requirements for arts programs at these institutions, including any stated eligibility or admissions criteria; pre-screening requirements; letter(s) of recommendation; personal statement, portfolio, and audition requirements; and art or design assignments which are included as part of the admissions process.

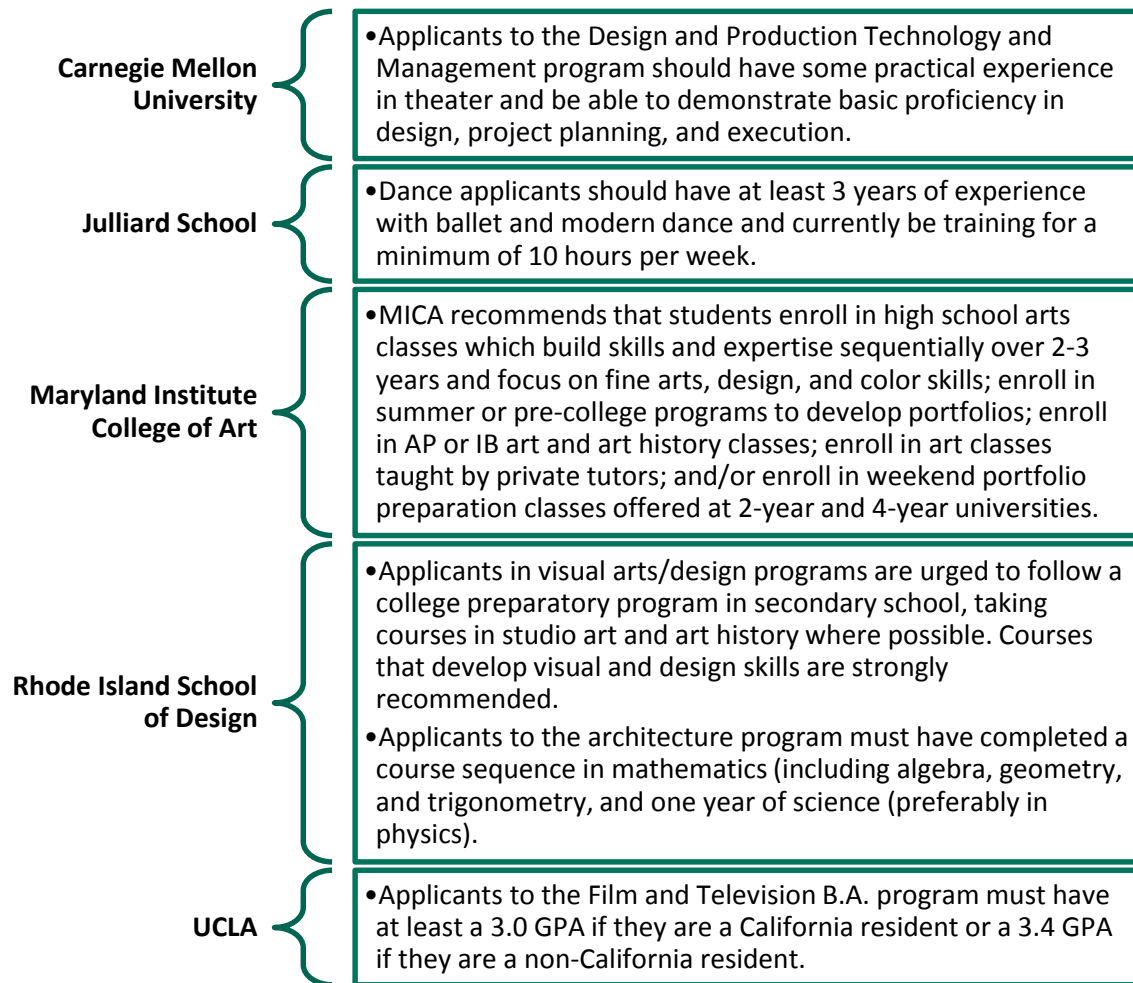
GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

Most programs require a personal statement or interview in which the applicant discusses their interest, experience, and professional aspirations in their chosen field and their interest in the specific program to which they have applied. In addition, most programs require portfolios, auditions, or other evidence of the student's experience, skills, and ability in the program area to which they are applying. **However, few institutions state specific high school coursework or training requirements needed for admission.**

An exception to this trend is a small number of art schools and theater, dance, and architecture programs, described in Figure 1.1 on the following page. The Rhode Island School of Design (RISD) and the Maryland Institute College of Art (MICA), for instance, both recommend that students enroll in arts courses in high school, and Julliard's dance program requires that students have at least three years of dance and ballet experience and training for a minimum of 10 hours per week. The remaining programs, however, do not require or recommend that students complete specific coursework or training in high school.

Moreover, although studio art and design programs generally require portfolio submissions, the works submitted are not required to have been completed in a high school class. In fact, several institutions encourage applicants to submit independently created projects. The Rhode Island School of Design, for example, states that applicants may submit works resulting either from “an assigned project or self-directed exploration,”¹ while the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) and Carnegie Mellon University both state that students are especially encouraged to submit self-initiated projects rather than classroom assignments.²

DANCE REQUIREMENTS

Auditions for dance programs typically require students to demonstrate 1) ballet barre work, 2) modern center work, and 3) improvisation. Pointe work is not a required part of the audition process except for at the University of Cincinnati's conservatory.³ A sample of audition requirements at the institutions examined in this report is provided in Figure 1.2.

DRAMA REQUIREMENTS

Applicants to programs in acting are typically required to complete an audition consisting of around two monologues in contrasting styles (i.e. from different types of plays or from plays from different periods). During the audition, applicants may be asked to adjust their performance based on feedback from the faculty panel. Further, applicants may be required to participate in a group acting or movement class in order for faculty to observe how applicants work with others and respond to feedback. Musical theater applicants must typically complete an acting audition as well as a singing and dance audition in which they perform several songs of contrasting styles and learn and perform a dance routine.

Programs in technical theater topics, such as production design or directing, typically require an interview and portfolio demonstrating the applicant's skills and experience in theater. Portfolios require work such as prompt books, photos of sets, light plots, images of costumes or scenery, or director's notebooks.

Finally, programs in playwriting and dramaturgy typically require a short acting audition and the submission of writing samples such as screenplays or critical analysis. Figure 1.3 on the following page provides examples of application requirements for drama programs.

Figure 1.3: Sample Application Requirements for Drama Programs

Carnegie Mellon University

- **Acting** - Audition requires 2 contrasting, one-minute monologues, one from a pre-1900 play with an emphasis on heightened language and one from a contemporary piece written in the 20th/21st century.
- **Music Theater** - Audition consists of 2 contrasting, one-minute monologues; 2 songs of contrasting style (16 bars each), one contemporary and one from a musical written prior to 1966; and a jazz dance audition demonstrating proficiency and potential for growth in dance.
- **Design Production Technology and Management** - Applicants must submit a portfolio of 15 works in any media demonstrating proficiency in design, project, planning, and execution.
- **Dramaturgy** - Applicants must submit a letter describing their experience and ambitions in theater and 2 writing samples demonstrating their ability to use evidence to support a thesis.
- **Directing** - Applicants must perform a monologue at an audition and provide a written critical analysis of the play from which the monologue is drawn. They must also submit a portfolio with evidence of their "creative life," such as production photographs from shows produced or directed, examples of creative writing, or examples of visual art.

George Mason University

- **Theater - Performance** - Audition consists of 2 contrasting monologues (three minutes total). Faculty will ask applicants to make adjustments and repeat portions of their work.
- **Musical Theater** - Audition consists of 2 contrasting monologues and 2 prepared songs that demonstrate variety.
- **Design and Technical Theater** - Applicants must submit a portfolio consisting of work such as photos, design sketches, technical drawings, playbills, reviews, or elements of the design process.
- **Playwriting and Dramaturgy** - Applicants must submit an original 3-5 page writing sample (screenplay, essay, or critical analysis) and perform a two-minute monologue.

University of Cincinnati

- **Acting** - Audition consists of 2 contrasting monologues, one classical and one contemporary.
- **Musical Theater** - Audition consists of a dance, vocal, and acting component. Applicants must perform one ballad and one up-tempo song, a jazz Broadway dance number, and a one-minute monologue.
- **Theater Design and Production** - Applicants must complete an interview and submit a personal statement in which they discuss their experience, achievements, and goals.

MUSIC REQUIREMENTS

In general, applicants to music performance programs must complete an audition in which they perform several pieces—around two to five pieces or excerpts—from the standard repertoire for their instrument. During the audition, applicants may also be asked to sight read and play major and minor scales. Applicants to jazz studies programs are usually asked to improvise during their audition. Applicants to voice programs are typically required to sing pieces in several languages—English as well as French, German, and/or Italian. A sample of application requirements for music performance and voice programs is provided in Figure 1.4.

Applicants to music composition or theory programs are generally required to audition in an instrument of the applicant's choice and/or complete an interview discussing their musical training, experience, skills, and goals. Composition applicants must also submit a portfolio of several original scores. Students are generally not required to have experience with music

composition software, although the University of Cincinnati encourages students to use Finale or Sibelius software to create the scores included in the portfolio.⁷ Oberlin College is the only institution among those examined which requires music theory exam as part of the application for admission. However, this exam is for course placement purposes rather than for admission.⁸

VISUAL AND MEDIA ARTS REQUIREMENTS

In general, visual and media arts programs require the submission of a **portfolio of around 10 to 20 works in various 2-D and 3-D media**. Works in the portfolio should demonstrate the applicant's creativity, technical skills, and artistic interests. Programs generally encourage applicants to include drawings from observation rather than copied from photos. As discussed previously, students may submit works created in or outside of class, although some institutions are especially interested in self-initiated work. For students who do not have enough works to submit a complete portfolio, Carnegie Mellon allows applicants to complete a design project consisting of several drawing and photography assignments.⁹ However, the other institutions examined in this report do not appear to offer this option. Examples of required portfolio submissions are described in Figure 1.5.

SECTION II: EMPLOYMENT PROJECTIONS

This section describes typical entry-level requirements for arts-related occupations and examines national and regional employment projections.

METHODS

To determine the employment outlook for arts-related occupations, Hanover examines 10-year national and state employment projections. This analysis relies on occupational-level projections from 2014 to 2024, using data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and state labor departments. The BLS classifies occupations through the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) system, a taxonomical structure used to “classify workers into occupational categories for the purpose of collecting, calculating, and disseminating data.”¹¹

The broadest occupational category—or “major group”—is indicated by a two-digit SOC code; the most specific occupational category—or “detailed group”—is indicated by a six-digit SOC code. These categories and divisions are based on the general work performed in the fulfillment of professional responsibilities and on the common requisite skills, education, and training that are required to successfully perform those duties.¹²

To identify arts-related occupations, Hanover included occupations listed under the occupational category 27 — Arts, Design, Entertainment, Sports, and Media Occupations. Detailed descriptions of these SOC codes are provided in the Appendix.

EDUCATIONAL AND TRAINING REQUIREMENTS IN ARTS OCCUPATIONS

Arts-related occupations and their respective six-digit SOC codes, along with typical educational and training requirements as defined by BLS, are listed in Figure 2.1 on the following page. **A bachelor’s degree is the typical entry-level education required for most arts-related occupations.** Occupations for which a degree is not a typical entry-level credential generally require moderate- to long-term training in the field.

NATIONAL PROJECTIONS

Figure 2.2 shows national employment projections for arts-related occupations from 2014 to 2024. **Overall, arts occupations are projected to experience growth of 4 percent during this ten-year period, behind the level of growth expected for all occupations (6.5 percent).** High-growth occupations are largely in the performing arts and design fields, including Actors (9.5 percent), Producers and Directors (9.1 percent), Set and Exhibit Designers (6.8 percent), Designers, All Other (6.7 percent), and Multimedia Artists and Animators (6.1 percent). Among these occupations, Producers and Directors, Actors, and Multimedia Artists are expected to have the highest number of average annual job openings.

REGIONAL PROJECTIONS

In APS' region,¹⁵ arts occupations are expected to grow by 8.2 percent, higher than growth expected at the national level but lower than the regional growth rate for all occupations (12.2 percent). As shown in Figure 2.3, occupations with the highest levels of expected growth include Choreographers (23.4 percent), Film and Video Editors (16.9 percent), Actors (15.1 percent), and Multimedia Artists and Animators (13.0 percent). However, these occupations are relatively low-volume. Graphic Designers are the highest-volume art-related occupation in APS' region, and regional employment of Graphic Designers is expected to grow by 10.3 percent over this period, much higher than the national growth rate of 1.4 percent.
